Bart Dailley introduced the day's speaker, Al Hathaway. Al is the Secretary/Treasurer of Calgary Crime Stoppers. Al is also a former Rotarian. His presentation dealt with the history and function of the Crime Stoppers program.

Crime Stoppers got its start in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Since its beginning, the organization has developed on an international basis. Crime Stoppers International provides a forum for all Crime Stoppers groups to share ideas. All Crime Stoppers groups work independently of each other.

Calgary Crime Stoppers was formed in 1982. It was the first Crime Stoppers group in Canada. There are 5 such groups working in Alberta. There are 9 satellite communities attached to Calgary Crime Stoppers. These are in communities such as Strathmore and Okotoks.

Crime Stoppers is a partnership of the general public, the police service and the media. Each Crime Stoppers group operates separately from the police service. The program is built on 2 conventions:

- 1) the reward offered has a maximum value of \$2000, and
- 2) the individual offering the tip must remain anonymous.

Individuals offering tips never have contact with the police and never have to appear in court.

Individuals can contact Crime Stoppers by phone or by internet. Informants do not identify themselves by name. They are given an identity number if they wish to follow up their contact with Crime Stoppers. Crime Stoppers will not contact informants. It is Crime Stoppers that passes the information on to the police authorities.

The amount of any reward is determined by a predetermined reward matrix. All rewards are paid out in cash through 3<sup>rd</sup> parties.

In Calgary, since 1982, Crime Stoppers has received over 11,000 tips. They average 10 calls per day. Over the past 18 years, tips have led to over 10,000 arrests and the recovery of over \$25,000,000 in money and property. Over \$1,000,000 has been paid out in rewards by

Calgary Crime Stoppers. Al stated that anonymity is the program's greatest asset and challenge. It can't be risked.

In 1916, Rotary founder Paul Harris shared his thoughts about the organization in an article titled “The Future of Rotary”, published in The Rotarian. Addressing the Rotary world, Harris concluded the short piece with wishes for the new year. In this 2010-11 Rotary year, consider his words:

I wish you all of the prosperity which your good deeds merit.  
 May all things you ought have be yours.  
 May your charities rank among your necessary expenditures.  
 May you not fall into the popular error of thinking that happiness is to be found in outdoing your neighbors.  
 May it always be yours to look beneath the veneer of life to the solid substance which lies beneath.  
 May you be builders, not mere climbers.  
 May you be able to appraise life's blessings at their real worth.  
 May you be free to act in accordance with the dictates of your own conscience and good judgment.  
 May you not be slaves to meaningless customs, social or otherwise.  
 May you shun the groove followers.  
 May you have vision to discern the right and health, strength and will to do it.  
 That is to say, I wish you a happy New Year.

The dreams parents have for their sons and daughters with developmental disabilities are no less than the dreams they and other parents share for their children without disabilities ... to have every opportunity for a career, make a contribution, earn an income, and be valued as community members. People with developmental disabilities share the aspirations of their families and want nothing more than the opportunity to demonstrate their potential. Unfortunately, the vast majority of Albertans with developmental disabilities are unemployed or underemployed.

Rotary is working to change that reality, and in District 5370 (mainly in the Edmonton area), they have been working on this goal for 10 years and have established a partnership with AACL and PDD to help create real jobs. Rotarians have generated over 120 jobs through this program. In all these years they haven't lost one employer from the program — sounds like a “win-win” indeed.

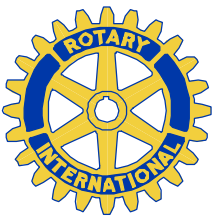
